

THOUGHTS FROM THE PULPIT...

Dear Church family and friends,

As I write a winter storm is wrapping up leaving the landscape draped in the beauty of fresh snow. Tree limbs, fence posts, our cars and even the bison in the pasture are cloaked in a blanket of white. There is something about freshly fallen snow that makes everything enchanting as it smoothes all the rough edges. It seems an analogy to me of what a fresh start looks like before all the footprints pockmark the way. A fresh start is what we are longing for these days and joyfully we are beginning to see that begin to play out as more



and more folks get vaccinated, injustices are being addressed more seriously and efforts toward protecting Earth are unfolding. These are things we can point to, but what about a fresh start within? This time in our lives has challenged us in ways we never thought we would witness or have to deal with. That reality has left us tired and eager for change. While external changes may not happen as rapidly as we would like, we can be the change agents for our own souls and discover peace to strengthen our lives.

In the Christian tradition the season of Lent is one that recognizes the story following Jesus' baptism when he spent 40 days in the desert wilderness. It was during that time of solitude and contemplation that he grew a deep preparedness for the purpose and plan of his life. It is common practice for many to eliminate something from their lives during these days of Lent as a symbolic recognition of the sacrifice Jesus made on our behalf, on

the behalf of love and to consider his model of meditation and spiritual awareness for one's personal faith.

I invite you to walk with me on a Lenten journey I am calling *A Pathway Forward*. Each Wednesday, I will publish a Reflection, as I have been, but with a theme of discovery and awareness. My intent is to encourage you toward a deeper awareness of the inner Presence of Spirit that dwells within you, opening you up to the strength and healing it brings. Following each Reflection on the themes outlined below will be an opportunity for you to apply the practice on your own. I encourage you to keep a personal journal of your experience if you wish, but most importantly, take the time to practice each day, if you can, and become aware of the closeness of God's Spirit within.

I hope you will join me in A Pathway Forward allowing this journey to be a trek across the pathway of your heart toward wholeness and peace.

WEBSITE INFORMATION...

The Waterford Congregational Church Website (<u>wccucc.com</u>) was created just over a year ago. The thought was to share Rev. Doretta's wonderful sermons with the community at large and with those away from Waterford. To compliment the sermon, I included lectionary readings and

thematic pictures. Soon, members of the congregation, like Bruce Whichard, started recording the choir, so I included those recordings as well.

When the Covid crisis struck, it became necessary to create a virtual church service. Our original online service grew to include Doretta's Pastoral Prayer and recorded items by members of the congregation. Now each week we have not only Doretta's sermon and prayer, but also the Lectionary Readers (arranged by Pam Williams); a Musical Anthem or two (arranged by Jane Morse); hymn selections (prepared and played by our wonderful organist, George Wiese); and occasionally a music selection (submitted by a musically-talented person like Al Struck, Denny Raymond, Jane Morse, Preston Harrison, or George Wiese.)

At the recent Annual Meeting, Al described the extraordinary amount of time it takes each of the people mentioned above to "build" these virtual church services and bring them to life.

- Sermon: It is no easy feat for Doretta and Ted to make that perfect sermon-recording each week. One week, their Bernese Mountain dog, Bentley, almost made a star appearance.
- Anthem: As described in the December newsletter, Jane takes 10 or so choral voices and Kay Leslie's piano accompaniment, all separately recorded, and blends them into one piece, an amazing technological triumph!
- Anthem part 2: A shout-out to the singers! It is a humbling experience to hear your voice, recorded on your hand-held device, with no other voices for support. It might take 5 or more attempts before I have something I am comfortable sharing with others. Jane is magical in putting these pieces together (removing the goofs, meows and chiming clocks) for all to enjoy!
- Lectionary: And...with today's handheld devices, each of the lectionary readers, practice and video record the Scripture readings on their individual phones or tablets. These sometimes require more than one take, as well.
- Hymns: George Wiese's contribution is amazing. He researches and chooses interesting
 hymns, related to the topic of the week. Some of these hymns have an historical significance
 or hymnological interest, which he shares verbally. George has a comprehensive collection of
 hymnals, which he would be glad to tell you about. Each week (weather permitting), he
 records 2 or 3 musical selections on a variety of different organs including our church organ
 or ones that he owns. He even goes to Sweden to play their organ for us!

All of the above is sent to me to load on the WCC website. With WIX.com, a bit of magic from YouTube and toothpicks (for the eyes), back stretches and finger exercises, the Sunday service comes to you as a complete whole. I start to put it together on Monday, and by mid-week it is nearly ready for all the creative pieces when they arrive by email or text message. My Saturday evening is devoted to finishing up and making the service pretty. Every week I learn some new technological trick, for which I am grateful! It's a blessing for all.



TRUSTEE'S REPORT...

December was an interesting month for the trustees. On Sunday morning December 6th, in the middle of the storm, I received a call from Peter Morse that we had trees that had come down and have done damaged to the church. I was still blowing my driveway so I called Kerry and asked him to review the damage. Two trees had come down on the roof



of the building and did damage to the roof and the chimney. I called Sheldon Rice of Rice Tree Service and they responded immediately. After review of the damage, he had his crew at the church on Thursday and they removed the trees from the building at no cost to the Church. We also decided to remove an additional eight trees to avoid any similar issues in the future.

James Long and Sons also responded immediately to my call for help. They reviewed the damages and made temporary repairs on Friday December 12th before the next round of bad weather came on Saturday. At this time the building is weather tight and we will complete the repairs in the spring. The response the we had from both James Long and Sheldon Rice was outstanding. Their quick action avoided any further damage from inclement weather.

We have turned the water off in both buildings and, with help from Ted Colburn, we have drained the hot water tanks, blown out the water lines, and put anti-freeze in the drains.


LET'S TALK ABOUT RACE - DISCUSSION GROUP...


Sponsored by the Waterford Congregational Church, UCC, Waterford, ME

Al's Comments:

Our Church has started a 6-month series of discussions to tackle the stubborn and emotion-filled questions that surround the relationships of white people and people of color. The Church Council gave the go ahead to do this using the curriculum set up by the UCC national leadership. The main topic of these sessions is the area of "White Privilege" and what that means to us as a country, church and individuals.

Deacon, Dianne Morse Leonard; Pastor, Doretta Colburn; and Moderator, Al Struck volunteered to be facilitators for the discussions. Our Clerk, Stephenie Michaud, handles all the technical parts of the sessions.





The ultimate goal by the end of the series is to have a better understanding of what White Privilege is, how it impacts non-whites and what we as groups and individuals can do to mitigate its impact among all different races in the U.S.

Although the roster is now full and the group is complete for this series, we hope to hold another series later in the year.



Doretta's Comments:

I am thrilled to be involved with our Let's Talk About Race program and working with Al, Dianne and Stephenie. As Al has already mentioned, the breadth of voices who have joined these 6 sessions are adding to the richness of our discussions. Systematic racism and white privilege are imbedded in our culture. They are realities that continue to oppress people of color everyday. These discussions open us to this truth as we examine our own actions and biases along with the consideration of how we can bring about positive change on a variety of levels.

CLIMATE CONVERSATIONS CONTINUE...




No! We have not forgotten. In fact, now more than ever, we need to be aware of our obligation to our climate and to the earth that sustains us, to our fellow citizens struggling with various and present impacts of the climate crisis, and to our children and grandchildren who will inherit the planet we leave them.

So, in the spirit of renewal of our personal commitment to confront our climate crisis, to act

in ways that will sustain us all, and to live in a spirit of stewardship in and for the earth, we have decided to restart our climate conversations. We will begin with a virtual session on **March 23rd at 6:30 pm**. Details will follow via email and posts on our church website (www.wccucc.com). If you are not on our email list, please let either Doretta or Kerry know and we'll put you on it.

Our first session will focus on Mary Robinson's wonderful book, *Climate Justice: Hope, Resilience, and the Fight for a Sustainable Future*. The book is available on most online book sites like Amazon either in electronic or paperback. Ms. Robinson is a former President of Ireland and has spent the last twenty years serving in a number of capacities as a champion for people who are already facing significant impacts from the climate crisis. She relates many poignant and powerful stories about how flood and drought, famine and fire, and numerous other calamities we face today are devastating lives and are, in fact, only a glimpse of what's to come. Throughout all of those descriptions she maintains a positive outlook and points us to many ways that we can take action to protect ourselves, our children and our grandchildren.



We'll ask each participant in our Zoom meeting to come prepared to discuss the book with each other in small groups and then share their collective wisdom with the large group. As always, our focus will be on "what we can do" personally and collectively to meet this challenge.

Those of you on our mailing list will have already received in late January a couple of important articles discussing the changes the new administration is making in Washington and reactions to those changes from leaders in business, environmental groups, and others. Significant changes are on the way including from unusual organizations, like General Motors. GM announced at the end of January that they will make a total shift of their fleet to all-electric by 2035. Imagine that! While this is a wonderful announcement it carries some serious questions, in particular, how will this change impact people who struggle to afford new cars? How will we make those new cars affordable?

We will be addressing issues like these in our climate conversations. We'll also be keeping you posted with articles and links on our church website. Please join us **March 23, 2021 @ 6:30 pm** for the renewal of our Climate Conversations and encourage others to join you. All in our church community and beyond are welcome.




A New Baby in the Whichard Family...


