

Good Frigid Morning,



We are all working together to do God's work. Sincerely, Al Struck. Moderator





An Interview (in part) with Joan Fillebrown

Church History Ginny Raymond

You came to Waterford as a little girl? You were not born here?

I came to Waterford after the Library burned and we moved [there] in 1938. ...[First]we rented a house [in South Waterford] from Mrs. Hapgood....Nobody would believe it had been taken down,. [It was] down by the Big Hamlin house... on the main road going down to Sweden...

So did your family join South Waterford Church?

...No, I don't remember that church running [at that time], but it must have.... [Later]I played [the organ] down there some.

Oh, you did too. Was [Charlotte Fillebrown] here in Waterford when you were born? Or did she live some place else at that time?

She always lived in that house. In the big house, over there, where Sally [Holm] lives?

Down there was a factory that belonged to Albert Hamlin. Albert Hamlin had a mill, up there in the V as you went to South Waterford, where Clara lives now.... Albert would haul stuff he'd sawed out down through town. Then he'd go down on that road to store it in a big building.... I don't know if that big building is [still] there or not? Well, anyway, Mother used to put us [Joan and Mac] down for a nap, and we'd each have a little dish of crackers or something. And Mac and I decided we would count the number of times Albert went by with his noisy tractor. Then we would get up and say we were awake. I wish I remember how many times but, it was busy. It was back and forth and back and forth. We must have lived on the first floor. I think she [Mrs. Hapgood] must have lived on the second floor. (See:

Mmmmm....After Walter [Charlotte's husband] died, She sold it to Margaret Doore and Charlotte moved. She did not like living under the face and eyes of the porch, so she had this [house] moved over here....

I've got [a] book that my mother kept. From the very beginning, the very first minister, right up through... I sort of kept it up, but I don't know what to do with it....

It used to be that you could run down to the store and get candy, and you cannot do that anymore.

I can't remember the name of the bread company.... Well, [the breadman] came in the store. And us kids were there, and he handed us each a little box of cigarettes. It was either 3 or 4 cigarettes

It was like a toy he gave you.... But you never smoked? No. I went home and I said, I'm going to try this if it kills me. So I lit them all up at once, and put them in my mouth. That was the end of that!

So you guys were never members down at South Waterford.

Not too many memories. I was friendly with Happy and Buelah Brown. [The Browns] lived there at the house across from Kimball's store....

[Charlotte] played in both places [the Flat and South Waterford]. I think maybe up on our organ there may be the date [when she started playing]... [I think] her mother played before her.... I know I was 14 when she taught me to play.

Did she teach you piano as well?

I don't think so. I don't think we even had a piano.

So you learned directly on the organ?

So that would have been the organ, and of course that was pump.

So you learned to play on the old pump organ on the church?

Yup...And I really took to pumping, Really. That was fun!

... And then they got the electric organ...

When the Earl Brown's split up, they gave them the organ we have now...I want to say 1950... This was Earl and Cornelia [who lived in what is now Kedarburn]....

I can't remember when [Charlotte] retired from playing. It was during my school years here. Well, Wanda Hamlin played... Kay Leslie played. I don't know if anyone else played... I played during the time I was in High School, and then we were married in 1950 and moved away: But off and on.

[When we were first married], Bill worked at the weather bureau in Caribou. We lived in Caribou for almost a year....He got transferred to Portland. And they made me fly down. Bill was working that day and came down to take me to Presque Isle. He knew what the weather was. I guess he was on pins and needles. I'd go along and [the plane went]whoop, whoop. The stewardess...I was alright, but I guess she was worried. ... I think we made four stops before we got to Bangor.... I had to wait to get on [the next plane]. Then it was just shshshsh [smooth].... Which was a good thing for me, because I might never had wanted to get on [a plane] again....[We went] from Bangor to Lewiston... Yup, my mother and brother were there waiting for me. We came to Waterford... I stayed here and it wasn't too long before I had Karen.














Birthday Fun
