Do you know about Oxford/Union Association?

The Oxford/Union Association is one of seven Associations of the Maine conference, which is also a member of the United Church of Christ. Today we have 20 churches in our Association.

The United Church of Christ is a union of four original denominations: Congregational, Christian, Evangelical, and Reformed. The Congregational Churches originated in England and transported to Massachusetts at Plymouth and Boston. The Christian denomination was a group of churches of several denominations who formed their own body. The other two were German immigrant churches.

What is the purpose of the Association?

The Association fosters fellowship and education among its members, offers joint opportunities for mission, and guides persons feeling called to authorized ministry through to ordination, oversees the ministry of Churches in a consultation fashion, and is responsible for seeing that clergy maintain their good standing as ministers.

The Association elects an Executive Council from member congregations, which oversees the Association's business between annual and semi-annual meetings. In addition, it conducts ordinations and installation of pastors in each of its Churches.

On Sunday, April 23^{rd.} 2018 the N. Waterford/E. Stoneham Churches hosted the Oxford/Union spring annual meeting. Following the business meeting, there was an educational component to our meeting. We had a presentation about NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness). Mental illness affects nearly 60 million Americans every year.

NAMI Faith Net is an information resource and network for NAMI members, clergy and people of faith from all faith traditions. The goal is to encourage the development of welcome and spiritually nourishing environments in every place of worship. (www.nami.org/faithnet)

We are fortunate that the Waterford Congregational Church is part of a bigger network. I encourage you to come to the next Oxford-Union Association meeting in November at the Lovell Church. We will come together to worship, catch up on what our partner churches are doing and aspire as a larger faith community to continue to be Christ's hands and feet.

Letter from the Moderator

Good Morning! What a glorious late spring day!

I was getting new hearing aids this morning, so watch out... I will be able to hear you across the church.

When my mind began drifting to the Bible reading a couple of weeks ago, the one in the book of Acts, Chapter 10, where the centurion is visited by strangers and told to invite Peter to his house. Meanwhile Peter is having this weird dream about unclean animals. What were they thinking? I thought it was pretty brave of the centurion to send an envoy to see Peter and follow the suggested invitation. Then Peter had to take a leap of faith and GO!

I envision the two men tentatively greeting each other and maybe sitting down in the cool of the day to have some refreshment. I can see Peter saying 'I wondered why you sent for me. Is there something I can do for you?' Whenever I read the Bible I try to put it into the context of the times: hot dusty locale, agrarian in nature, mostly travel by foot. And here comes this unbidden invitation. Then there is that dream too! "What God has purified you are not to call unclean." Then in what is called *Peter's discourse* the true message is revealed "...how true it is that God shows no partiality. Rather the man of any nation who fears God and acts uprightly is acceptable to him."

Why this recap of a reading?

Well, the appearance of distrust and refusal to speak with someone who is not "one of us" is wreaking havoc on our country. We need to meet with and listen to what others are saying and ask ourselves why they believe what they say. If we can discern from what we hear that those persons are Godfearing and acting uprightly, do we have the strength of spirit to accept why they believe what they do? This is not capitulation; it is understanding. Hopefully, those you are listening to will return the favor and listen to you also. This is the beginning of discourse. Civilized people speaking and listening to each other.

This is what our church and its committees are doing. We are reaching out to folks in our community who need help, who enjoy music, and who enjoy fellowship. You will read in other reports what exactly these committees are doing. It is good work! It is hard work! We should all do whatever we can to help and be part of this work.

I hope that God continues to shine his grace upon our church and each of us.



As we near the middle of our fiscal year the Stewardship Committee would like to give you all an update and a "shout out." As a church community, we have been generous in our giving for 2018 and this has allowed us to do many of the things we hoped to as we entered the year. Our finances are tracking as we had hoped and the level of church activities has increased.

You may recall that this year's Stewardship appeal was focused on enabling us to actively begin enacting the three elements of our vision—community, spirituality, and music. Of course, we were concerned about sound fiscal management and covering our operating budget, but we also wanted to do something tangible addressing each part of our vision. We've done it. We're doing it. We will continue doing it.

We have again actively joined the library in a number of community efforts, and we've joined in our support of the Town's community-building activities. We have also worked to expand our internal church community through outreach (thanks CAC), and through a more visible effort at welcoming people to our church (thanks Deacons). Our Lenten Booklet was well received not only by our members, but also by our friends in North Waterford. This represents both a commitment to increasing our community-building efforts and our explicit efforts to focus on spirituality. In addition, the meditation space behind the church will be ready for use in a few short weeks. Meanwhile, the music committee continues to bring a wonderful energy not only through the performance of our own choir, but also through the performances of outside musicians. This summer they will highlight the use of outside musicians through several special performances.

There are many other examples of how we are living into our vision of ourselves and of how your individual and collective contributions are making this possible. 
A piece of history...



Later, I trained in Reading Recovery[™], learning how to work with students to teach from their strengths to foster more independence at reading. This was such a boost to my teaching that I switched to become a Title 1 Reading Interventionist so I could teach Reading Recovery[™] half my day and small groups the rest of the day. Since 2003, I have taught RR in six of SAD 17's eight elementary schools (including Waterford Memorial, where I went to school).



James Long reports on Caren's surprise


What a surprise for Caren: to get to work and find her desk all decorated for her thirty years of service at the hospital as *Head of Communications* since April 18, 1988.


That voice comes from a strong and varied background as a science teacher, a 20-year ministry in the United Church of Christ—most recently in N. Waterford, and years of organic farming and herding on the property that has been in her husband's family for four generations. She is running because she believes in promoting a platform of justice, equality, fairness and social responsibility.

Colburn has a strong background in leading and serving the community. She has served three terms as president of the local Rotary Club, sits on the Waterford Library Board, and on the board of the Waterford World's Fair where she developed and runs an annual program to teach young children about agriculture.

This past year, members of Colburn's family have moved to Waterford to help make the family farm successful and sustainable. Her sister and brother-in-law, Sharon and Preston Harrison, have become regular attendees at the Waterford Congregational Church, where Colburn has served as a substitute pastor since retiring from N. Waterford five years ago. Her daughter and son-in-law, Erin and Ed Girzone, have also moved to town and in addition to helping on the farm, have opened a wellness studio called *Good Health Is a Habit* that offers yoga, fitness and Zumba classes. They also have two young sons.





Spanish, English, early Scots and more. -- Carol Madsen


