Have you ever lost something and then known the joy when you find it in the most unexpected place: Car keys, credit cards, or you are just plain lost driving around because the GPS failed. When we lose tangible things we go to the 'lost and found' department. Where do we go when we lose Jesus?

Easter morning we are up early to celebrate the joy of finding Jesus. Back in the day, some people thought that following Jesus was a crazy thing to do. They did not believe his teachings nor that he was the Son of God. How fitting it is that we are gathered on April Fools Day. And the joke is on the nonbelievers. There are those who think us foolish for standing in the freezing cold to celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

Mary Magdalene had thought she had lost Jesus on this day. She was not celebrating. Instead she was searching for answers and distressed about the absence of the body in the tomb. During her bewilderment she did not recognize Jesus at first, despite his calling out to her. She was not expecting to find him alive; she was not expecting a miracle.

It was as if Mary had a blind spot because she was so distraught about losing her teacher. Imagine Mary trying to make sense of what she saw or did not see, such as the carefully folded up linen, the stone removed, and an empty rock slab. Where was the body? She heard a voice and looked up at the face of the gardener, not realizing that she had found Jesus.

Where do we go to find Jesus? The 'lost and found' — I don't think so! Finding Jesus is different for everyone, including those of us on a chilly morning in Waterford, Maine and around the world, as we celebrate today through scripture and singing the joy of finding Jesus.

We live in the Easter assurance that Jesus is alive and that even though we don't always recognize his presence, we do take comfort that Mary Magdalene witnessed Jesus' new life which is also promised for us. So everyday, not just on Easter, go out there and expect a miracle.






Church Railings

It was a hard winter on the church step railings!

You may have noticed that two of them had been bent very badly by a motor vehicle. But the James Gang and their crew came to the rescue. With the right equipment and knowledge, and heart's desire for pleasing God, they are looking like new again.

The prime and paint makes them look as good as they did in 2009 when the stairs were renovated. At that time we took the railings to the farm and sand blasted them. They were really rusty and the brass balls were dark brown from oxidation.

This winter we had to repair them in place. The Blue Rock Stone people, who did the stair renovation, set them in an extremely strong adhesive which held even with the railings being car-damaged. If you look at the post with the discoloration on it, that is the one we had to heat to straighten it.

From the Wilkins House




