Dear Friends,

A few days ago as I was walking passed our porch window that looks out to the hills, a bright red color stood out among the green leaves in the tree at the top of our driveway. I knew it wasn't a cardinal and I had a hopeful thought that it might be a bird I haven't seen since I was a child. I picked up the binoculars and sure enough, it was a scarlet tanager. It's brilliant reddish orange was highlighted even more by the backdrop of green. To say the least, I was in my glory as I watched it perched singing away for quite some time. I'm not sure how long it was there because I had to move on, though reluctantly, and I have not seen it since. Yet, I can still see it in



my mind's eye and smile every time I do. Partly nostalgic and fully in awe of its delicate beauty.

As I reflect on that moment, I consider the image it brings to mind of our church community faithfully, eagerly, vocally, standing out as a hope-filled presence in the midst of a challenging world and I am, once again in awe and gratitude. We are a wonderful mix of folks, diverse in our backgrounds and individual in our spiritual paths, yet united in striving to make a positive difference in our community and in our world. 
musicians in our lovely church. Donations will be gratefully accepted at the door.

THE GATHERINGS BOOK STUDY...Learning about the Indigenous People of Maine

In an effort to continue to learn about and clarify our understanding of people of different races and cultures a book group was started to read and discuss the book "The Gatherings". This book is about the courage of two people and a desire to help their friends build relationships and understanding of one another. Shirley N.Hager and gkisedtanamoogk (he does not capitalize his name) brought Indigenous and non-Indigenous people together in a setting called the Talking Circle. Meeting twice a year for 6 years they built trust, friendship and a fuller comprehension of the impact of the meeting of their two cultures. They also explored ways to mend old wounds.



Doretta, Dianne Morse-Leonard, and I facilitated the group which met 4 times in the month of May. We had a number of folks from our congregation and from as far away as New Mexico. There were 18 of us in all.

When the series of meetings ended we agreed we had learned a lot and wanted to know more. We also wanted to do something that would increase the visibility of the Indigenous people of Maine through laws that were being debated in our current legislature. Some of our efforts were successful some weren't. Dianne told the Committee on Social Justice about our group and now we are repeating the book study for them.

UKRAINIAN REFUGEE RELIEF PROJECT ... by Al Struck

It was the last day of March, a Thursday, a chilly spring-like day. Folks in Waterford were rising from under nice warm blankets, smelling fresh coffee brewing and the bacon sizzling.

It was the same day, but noonish and pretty much the same temperature about 6,000 miles to the East on the border of Poland and Ukraine. There more than a million refugees have fled from the war in Ukraine. There had been no warm blankets that night and babies were kept protected

from the cold night air inside their mother's coats. Breakfast was only a memory and a mid day meal was questionable. These people, forced from their peaceful homes, wondered among themselves if anyone knew what they were experiencing and if anyone cared.



As it turns out, there were people who cared and, most importantly, were doing something to relieve their plight. The Deacons at the Waterford Congregational Church had met on Wednesday, March

one of the church members, came to the meeting to describe a relief program, "Maine to Ukraine," started by the Retail Association of Maine and the Maine Tourism Association. The two associations were looking for donations of shelf-stable food, utensils, hygiene products and monetary gifts — with a deadline of April 1st. Quickly, on social media in the Waterford Church, word of mouth, and posters placed in the community, the message spread. Donations were brought to the church where a big box was placed on the church steps. Ted





Nixon emptied the box daily and brought the contents into the church for safe keeping.

Money donations sent to the our church were deposited in a special account. 100% of the donations are going to this Ukrainian relief program. The Waterford community and surrounding area responded with the generosity. When volunteers arrived at the church on Thursday morning, March 31st, to load the donations collected, they found enough to fill a pickup truck. They transported this to the Fryeburg Maine Tourism Center. The monetary donations collected in the six days totaled \$2600. The "little church with the big heart" had done it

again, rallying its congregation and community to action. Soon, Ukrainian refugees would receive our outpouring of love and hope and care. They would find out we do know about them, and we do care about them, and we did something about it.

THEIR YOUNGEST SON'S ACHIEVEMENT...

On May 30th at 6:30 pm Alaska time, Jamie Struck and three other members of their expedition 2Hot2Cold, summitted Mt. Denali's south peak at 20,310ft. It was the 17th day of their climb which required multiple trips between camps at 7,000, 14,500, 17,500 to transfer food and supplies needed for the final assault of the summit. This is Jamie's second attempt to summit. The first was in 2018 when the expedition was stymied by Denali's fickle weather. This time the weather was exceptional allowing them to make excellent progress to "High Camp". From there the team decided to push on the next day without a rest day to take advantage of the good weather. It paid off in a successful ascent and a safe return to high camp. The team then went to Anchorage to prepare for their trips back home to California and Vermont, hence the moniker 2Hot 2Cold, used as the expedition's name. During their climb two other climbers died and four had to be medivaced off the mountain. The success of Jamie's team was due to their experience, skill, and preparation.
