Dear Waterford Church Family,





This has been quite a year for our Waterford Church. We are in full swing implementing our vision, and our progress has been amazing. In all three of our ministries—service, music, and spirituality—we have done some wonderful things thanks to you. For me, it is especially heartening to see how we have also reached out to our neighboring congregations to include them in achieving some of our goals.

This year our Stewardship message is:

An interview (in part) with Happy Chapman

Church History Ginny Raymond

You were born Happy Hamlin?

My first name is Margarette: Margarette Happy. Happy is for my great grandmother. My Mother's grandmother was... her name was Happy... I had three older brothers. They never thought they were not going to have a daughter, I guess. And boy was my father tickled when he finally got a daughter.

And you were quite a bit younger than your siblings, right?

My youngest brother was five years older than I, and he was the only one I was really close to. And when I think about it, I married Wallace and he was eleven years older than I, and my oldest brother was eleven years older than I, but I was not close with him. (laugh). I never knew what Wallace saw in me... I was just a kid. I was 15.

How long were you married to Wallace?

Over fifty years,

Then Perry came along?

And then Perry came along, right. Actually, Wallace and Perry were friends when they were young. So that is how I met. I met Perry...

... Now growing up in Waterford: You grew up on Mill Hill?

No, I grew up in South Waterford.

... did you go to the church in South Waterford?

Ahhh, Not very much. The church was closed for a long time.

When you were a child?

Yes. And we only had the church at the Flat. And finally some of us decided that we were going to lose the church because we still had two members, but they were elderly, and if they passed away we would lose the church. So some of us changed from the Waterford church membership to the South Waterford Church because we wanted to keep the church. But then we ended up losing it anyway,

because we just got down to two or three members, and you can't keep a church going on that.

... Actually, back when I was young, we were part of the, gee... I want to say the United Parish [Oxford County United Parish], and I am not sure what that took in. Stoneham and Lovell, and another town as well as the Waterfords.

But eventually ... it was just the Waterford Churches.

And [when I was young] we were always in the Flat [for church] during the summer.

Always, Always, because that was what they insisted on. Because that is where the summer people went. And they depended on the summer people for income, actually a lot, and so naturally we would have wanted that because it was the best for the Parish anyway

And do you remember when the South Waterford Church closed?

No, I don't but it has been a long time.

I was thinking in the 70s... [early 80's?]

Probably

I remember my Dad going down and talking with the people that bought it, and I guess they ended up having a sale there for stuff.

Yes they did....

It was heart breaking when they finally had to close it. I guess because it was part of my childhood. I mean, I was a South Waterford girl.

... So is there anything that you would like to tell me about your childhood or about ... growing up in Waterford?

...Actually, I didn't have very many friends because everybody was older than I that lived in town. I can remember one day when I was a kid, I always had to go to bed at 7 o'clock, when I was growing up. And in the summer time it was still daylight, and at that time, as I said, I was young, my bed was still in my parent's room, and it was right beside the window and I would look out the window and there would be kids out on the street playing, and I was so mad because I had to go to bed. (laughs)

I understand that!

You were there in the village, so you did not have a farm there? You did not have any animals or anything?

Yeah, my father had cows.

Oh he did? Where did he run them?

Well you know, back then there was not much traffic. So we would take the cows and they would leave them over to Bear Mountain... Down almost to the lake, actually: land up on the mountain there.

It's all woods now then.

Yes.

You've seen a lot of change that way then.

Oh yeah!

A lot of change everywhere!

Another wedding for the Plates!






On Sept 29th, Henry and Joy Plate were able to see another grandchild get married!



Proceeds will go to community charities and the local church music mission.

The group's repertoire encompasses various epochs and styles - from ancient Russian chants and chorals of Western European to modern music. Since one of the tasks of the ensemble is popularization of preeminently Russian music, our program allows to most fully elucidate and introduce to the audience Russian folk songs, secular and ecclesiastic compositions, as well as modern composers and transpositions of popular melodies. In a wide range of time we represent examples of Russian sacred music, starting from ancient songs of the Orthodox Church to works of little-known, but remarkable composers of the 18th—20th centuries, as well as famous masters - D. Bortnjansky, P. Tchaikovsky, P. Tchesnokov, A. Gretchaninov, S. Rachmaninov, I. Stravinsky and others. We perform different folk songs of lyric. We make our own arrangements of folk songs. Secular songs of Russian classics, such as S. Taneev, P. Tchaikovsky, S Rachmaninov and others represent another side of our creative activity.
