FROM THE MODERATOR

Dear Friends,

We have just finished a wonderful summer of church activities and plans for the fall. Our committees are moving forward pursuing our vision of Spirituality, Music and Service. At our September Council meeting Petra submitted her verbal notice of leaving her call at our church. I am sure you can imagine the reaction of the Council. Of course, while coping with being stunned,

we were understanding of the reasons Petra shared. However, we quickly got on board and began to grapple with the process of finding a replacement minister. I was asked to contact the UCC and find out the actual process. This I did. The Rev. Darren Morgan from the UCC is our contact. He led us in an informational meeting on September 23.

At that meeting he explained the two-step process we need to pursue. The first step is to engage an "Interim" minister. Rev. Morgan explained that there are not many pastors trained to help with this process of developing a profile to identify the kinds of skills we as a church are looking for in a new minister. To get that person on board we needed to complete a form. Both Myra and Kerry helped me complete it with the data supplied by various committee chairs. Once UCC receives it, Rev, Morgan will speak with available "Interim" ministers to see who might be interested in working with us. We hopefully will have this ready to go following Petra's last Sunday with us on October 28th.

The Interim Minister will assist us in completing our church profile. This 42-page document will explain to prospective ministers just who we are, where we came from, where we are going, and what our vision is for getting there. As you can see, we have a set of tasks before us. I have no doubt that we are up to working through them, and in the process, keep our church strong.

This is a good point to stop, take a breath and remember where we started when Petra joined us and where we are now. Petra brought a new level of energy to our church. It took a lot of us some time to get up to speed, but once we did we were movin'! We began to look around and realized that it had been years since we had explored the mission of our church.

The visioning work we did and the conclusion we arrived at revitalized us and gave us energy to pursue our three areas of focus: Spirituality, Music and Service. Each of these areas has seen growth — be it in the work being done by folks in the service itself and with other churches, the concert series that has been started, and the mission work and collaboration with the town to reach out to others in our community. We are letting our light shine!



During Petra's remaining weeks with us we will have opportunities to celebrate what we have accomplished with Petra as our spiritual leader. As we have grown, we have changed for the better. Part of the process mentioned above asks what kind of skills we will be looking for in our new minister. They will be different from the time when Petra was called to where we are now. Petra has grown and so have we.

So, my friends, like the good Yankees we are (transplants and native born), we will roll up our collective sleeves, give Petra a well-deserved bear hug as she prepares to move on and then turn our energies to keeping this "Little Church with the Big Heart" moving forward to God's greater glory.

Announcing the 2019 Lenten Reflection: How Has God Challenged You?

The Church Activities Committee has chosen the theme for the second edition of the Waterford Congregational Church's booklet of Lenten Reflections. We are asking everyone in our church family to share a story, a poem, an essay, a captioned photograph, or a work of art that reflects a personal experience of God challenging them.

To start your thinking, we suggest that you might ask yourself these questions:

When have you felt that God is pushing you to do something risky, beyond your comfort zone? How did you respond? What was the outcome? When has life seemingly thrown something at you that you feel incapable of handling? How did you respond and what part did God play in your response? Have God's challenges made us fearful, or have they inspired or excited us?

God is the greatest mystery in our lives. We experience God's presence in every possible way: In joy and exhilaration, in longing and despair, in loss and grief, in beauty, and in anger. Just as we cannot predict the future, we cannot know how God operates or why events unfold as they do. When our faith is strong, we know that God will guide and teach us how to stay on the path to a Christian life.

When we ask God's guidance, we never know what the response might be, or how to interpret God's message to us. Through our faith, we trust that God's goodness and generosity are constants in our lives. When prayers are answered, we rejoice, our gratitude is boundless, our faith is affirmed. When it seems they are not, we may flounder in our discouragement. We may feel anger or grief, abandoned by our God. We may feel unworthy of God's love. Living in faith is an ongoing struggle with what it means to be a human creature of God's creation on a journey full of challenges though the ultimate mystery. Living in faith means learning to practice deep listening so that we might come closer to understanding God's presence in our lives. Sharing these experiences in our faith journey also deepens our connections to each other.

The mechanics of the process of producing the book follow a timeline ending just before Lent, which begins on Wednesday, March 6, 2019. We hope to have pieces for each day of the Lenten season. These reflections will form our daily devotionals for the 40-day period.

We encourage all contributors to include a pertinent scripture with their submission, though this is not a strict requirement. All submissions must run no longer than 350 words. Any that do may need to be edited down. Editing assistance can be provided, if necessary. And if you need some help with the actual writing, that can also be arranged.

To encourage your participation, Kerry and I again will be offering a basic writing workshop—on Tuesday, November 13 from 7 to 8:30 pm in the Wilkins House where you can share ideas, hopefully learn some helpful techniques, and perhaps even get a good start on your contribution.

In order for the Lenten Booklet to be delivered in time for Lent, your contribution MUST be received by Monday, Feb. 1, 2019. Please send your piece to sallyvholm@gmail.com.

In November the Mission Committee will be helping the CAC with Thanksgiving Baskets. Stay tuned for more information in the coming weeks.



From the ONA (Open and Affirming) committee

The ONA committee has been meeting for the past couple of months to explore the possibility of the Waterford Church to become Open and Affirming. The following is a piece of literature that has been taken from the "Open and Affirming Coalition" for the United Church of Christ.

"All Are Welcome" Isn't Enough

Lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) people of faith often experience emotional and spiritual injury in churches that condemn their capacity to love and seek love. Because they've learned that "All Are Welcome" usually doesn't apply to them, they can't assume that any church will be safe for them and their families.

A public welcome by an Open and Affirming (ONA) church sends a clear message to LGBT seekers that they have a home in the United Church of Christ.

A congregation's affirmation and support through an ONA covenant can be a life-changing and life-saving experience – especially for LGBT youth.

A public welcome to LGBT seekers helps churches grow. When new ONA churches attract new members, many of them are young straight couples starting new families: they identify with the values ONA represents and want their children to learn the faith in a welcoming church.

By adopting on ONA covenant, a congregation is taking seriously St. Paul's admonition to "accept one another, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God." (Romans 15:7, NIV)

We talked to our neighbors, who also heard TAPS the night before. We talked with fishermen who were out on the lake, who were also thrilled to hear TAPS. Word traveled quickly around Lake McWain, neighbors talking to neighbors, everyone enjoying the mysterious playing of TAPS. How honoring to our great Veterans, how beautiful the sound rolling down the lake, bouncing off the trees, echoing through the mountains.



Our investigation finally came to a close, when we discovered that Tom Lentz, Stephanie Michaud's son, Pam Williams' grandson, who is also a veteran of the Marines, was the source of Lake McWain's enjoyment of TAPS.

Tom was playing his trumpet, not only because his grandfather Lloyd had asked him to play that particular song, but Tom was honoring his friends and fellow Marines. Little did Tom realize, the positive effect his lone respectful trumpeting had on the hearts, minds and souls of so many individuals who were fortunate enough to hear him play; nor did Tom realize how the "audience" grew nightly, around the shores of Lake McWain, as folks eagerly awaited Tom's solemn tribute.

Yes, Dad, sound does travel over the water!
